Both trees #1 & 2 are located in the rear yard. Tree #1 is of good health and structure with no significant defects present. It has adequate room to grow. It has some limbs overhanging the garage and dwelling but these do not pose a high hazard. This tree is suitable for inclusion within the Register. ~~Tree #2 is located at the side of the yard on Highview Grove. It has a very large stem diameter and canopy spread and dominates the landscape. The canopy was of good health. There was some fungal decay observed in the main stem and it is unclear, given the overall area of the stem, the extent of this decay appeared minimal. There was also damage to the footpath in Highview Grove. The tree should be included on the register as its size outweighs the negative points, which could be managed.~~






